Did you License your Dog with the City?

Just a reminder to dog owners in Somersworth: the City does require you to register your dog every year. We are currently preparing our annual forfeiture notices where additional fees and fines are levied and you could be summonsed to court.

If you haven't licensed your dog yet, it is easy and licenses can even be renewed online if you have the dog's tag number at **www.Somersworth.com** and click on the Online Services and then Dog Licensing.

If you are unable to complete it on line, City Hall staff will help you. Just bring your current rabies certificate. City Hall is open Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:30 pm.

Summer Pet Safety

We receive calls every day from caring citizens about animals left in vehicles on warm days. It takes only minutes for a pet left in a vehicle on a warm day to succumb to heatstroke and suffocation.



Even when the outside air temperature is in the 60's, temperatures inside some vehicles can reach the danger zone on bright, sunny days. Many experts recommend not leaving pets or children in parked cars even for short periods if the temperature is in the 60's or higher.

Rolling down a window or parking in the shade doesn't guarantee protection either, since temperatures can still climb into the danger zone. And if the window is rolled down sufficiently, the pet can escape.

Animals are not able to sweat like humans do. Dogs cool themselves by panting and by sweating through their paws. If they have only overheated air to breathe, animals can collapse, suffer brain damage and possibly die of heatstroke. Just 15 minutes can be enough for an animal's body temperature to climb from a normal 102.5 to deadly levels that will damage the nervous and cardiovascular systems, often leaving the animal comatose, dehydrated and at risk of permanent impairment or death.

Precautions: Please leave your dog at home on warm days.

A safety message from the Fire Chief's Office

With Independence Day and the majority of summer in front of us, everyone is reminded that thousands of emergency room visits a year throughout the country occur due to fireworks injuries. More than 30 percent of those injuries are blamed on sparklers. Sparklers are exciting for children but burn at 1,200 degrees. Children should always be supervised around fireworks. When using sparklers remain at least six feet away from one another and have a water bucket close by to dispose of the spent sparkler. Do not simply drop spent sparklers on the ground especially if children are running around with bare feet. Improper use of fireworks can change a life in an instant - even a sparkler.



Metal Pick-up: 2nd Tuesday of each Month

When - next Curbside Collection: Tuesday, July 12th

How: Call Public Works no later than 3:00 pm on

Monday, July 11th, place curbside with the proper number of Bulky Waste Stickers on each item. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00.

Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30 am-2:30 pm Monday –Friday. *Note that weather emergencies may delay collection.*

Curbside MSW/Household Garbage & Recycling Collection

City trash bags and recycling containers must be at the curbside no later than 7:00 am & no sooner than the evening before your designated collection day.

As a reminder – Trash and Recycling Collection for the week of July 4th will be delayed one day for Independence Day. Monday, July 4th collection will take place on Tuesday, July 5th, Tuesday collection will take place on Wednesday, July 6th and Wednesday collection will take place on Thursday, July 7th.

Malley Farm Facility

Malley Farm is now open for disposal of brush and leaves, Monday – Friday 7:30am – 2:30pm and Saturday and Sunday 8:00am-6:00pm. Please note: Any Contractor serving a Somersworth residence with leaves and brush hauling, will need to obtain a permit from Public Works to dump at Malley Farm.

Root balls and wood larger than 5" in diameter and 10' in length are not permitted. Please call the Public Works Department at 603-692-4266 for further information.


Driveway, Obstruction & Trench Opening Permit Reminder

Rocky Hill Road Culvert Replacement to occur mid-summer

City Council awarded a contract to Wickson Construction to replace a culvert located on Rocky Hill Road, close to the intersection with Winter Street and Maple Street. The project involves replacing an old failing corrugated metal culvert and a segment of water and sewer lines in the vicinity of the culvert. The project will involve a temporary road closure from the first week in July through the beginning of October in this area. Rocky Hill Road will be closed at Winter Street; during the temporary road closure period.

Adopt-A-Spot

Somersworth residents are encouraged to participate in the City's Adopt a Spot program. Subject to review by the Public Works staff, any public space may be a candidate for volunteers to "Adopt" and help the City reduce litter along City streets, improve and maintain landscaping at a corner traffic island, a garden in Forest Glade Cemetery, or a raised flower bed in the Downtown District. Green Grass & Clear Water



Did you know that you can have a healthy, green lawn that is both attractive and safer for the environment?

Some lawn care practices create local water quality problems. Excess nutrients (including nitrogen and phosphorus found in fertilizers) that run off our properties into nearby waterbodies can trigger harmful algal blooms.

Many of us enjoy the time we spend working on our lawns and are willing to try new practices as long as our lawns continue to look good. This information card shares simple and easy tips, customized for northern New England, that can lead to Green Grass & Clear Water.

1 Choose the right grass seed. The best seed mixes include low maintenance varieties with higher % of fine-leaf fescues and turf- or compact-type tall fescues, and lower % of Kentucky bluegrass and perennial rye grass.



2 Mow smart. Leave grass at least 3" high. Cut no more than one-third (1/s) of the blade each time you mow to encourage longer, stronger roots. Leave the grass clippings after mowing so they can return nutrients to the soil.



3 Don't overwater. 1" of water per week (from rain or irrigation) is usually enough. Overwatering can cause nutrients to move out of root zones and into waterbodies or groundwater.



Have your soil tested to learn more about specific characteristics and needs of your lawn. Contact UNH Cooperative Extension: extension.unh.edu/programs/soil-testing-services

Only if your lawn requires added nutrients from fertilizer:



Avoid overapplying. Measure the area where you plan to apply and calculate the square footage. For lawns 10+ years old, apply half (½) the amount recommended for your square area one time per season. New lawns may need another application. Apply no more than 4 times per season.



6 Choose the right fertilizer. Select fertilizers with zero or low phosphrous unless a soil test says otherwise.

Slow release nitrogen fertilizer is generally preferable. Overapplying fertilizer (any type) can causes water quality issues.



Know when and where to apply. Apply only after spring "green up" and before mid-September. Avoid applying in mid-summer. Never apply near waterbodies or storm drains.

DO I HAVE A SEPTIC SYSTEM?

You most likely have a septic system if:


- You are on well water and you don't pay a water or sewer utility bill.
- · Your neighbors have septic systems.

HOW DO I FIND MY SEPTIC?

- Check your yard for lids or manhole covers.

HOW DOES IT WORK?



- Whatever goes down the drain is your domestic wastewater. All drains in your house lead to one large drainage pipe that empties into your septic tank.
- The septic tank is a buried, water-tight container, usually made of concrete or polyethelene. It holds the wastewater long enough for solids to settle to the bottom, while oils and grease float to the top. Special compartments keep the solids from flowing into the leach field.
- 3 Liquid wastewater leaves the tank and enters the leach field, where special pipes allow the water to slowly seep into the surrounding soil, naturally removing harmful bacteria, viruses and nutrients before it renters the groundwater.

SEPTIC SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

It's not just about pumping! Here are every-day things you can do to help maintain your system.

- Conserve water Fix leaky faucets and toilets to prevent washing away the healthy bacteria your system needs.
- Space out water use Spreading out washing machine loads and and other large water uses (showers, dishwashers, etc.) gives your system a chance to work between loads.
- Only flush human waste and toilet paper "Flushable" may only mean that it fits down the drain... if in doubt, throw it out.
- Don't park or drive on your system This can easily damage the septic system.

Development Services

Resiliency Academy

Molly Donovan of the *UNH Cooperative Extension Program* and Elizabeth Gray, from the *Small Business Development Center*, established a partnership to bring

the <u>2022 Resiliency Academy</u> to Somersworth. This program was cooperatively created by the Community Development and Planning Department, because resiliency is at the core of a healthy, vital, and vibrant community of which (it was agreed by all) Somersworth is an extraordinary example for the entire seacoast. *Resilience* is the ability to respond, adapt and recover from the challenges of a sudden shock such as major staff changes, a fire, natural disaster, or pandemic. Often it is described as *getting back to where you were*, and *getting back to normal*, or strategically creating a *new normal*. In this time of COVID-19 we are seeing an expanded definition the pandemic has disrupted the economy, employment, and community vibrancy.

The morning program held on Thursday, June 16, was attended by approximately 40 seacoast professionals from a variety of fields and professions, all of whom are seeking a better understanding of resiliency itself, and what that may mean to both their business and community. We are deeply grateful to our extraordinary panel of seacoast business leaders who discussed and demonstrated resiliency in their business model and best practices. After the panel discussion, attendees took a walking tour around Somersworth past, present, and future concepts for change and development toward the future, all who attended noted that Somersworth is a "beautiful city "and that it is as "rich in history and charm ", and many commented too on how friendly the people are. Most important is that all noted how resilient Somersworth has been in the past, and is in the present, which is the foundation of a wonderful, highly desirable thriving community.

Granite State Track & Field Program Update~



On Saturday, June 18th our **Granite State Track and Field** team competed at the District Meet at Spaulding High School.
