Graduation Speech for the Class the 2018

Each year I have the honor of addressing the graduating class of Somersworth High School. Here is this year's departing words to the Class of 2018; "Our mere existence is chance, the air we breathe, chance, The creation of the planet we live on, chance"

While each day we process thousands of choices, it is still the laws of probability which govern. Do we wake up at the allotted hour or hit the snooze bar. The outfits we choose, the route we drive, the flavor or style of coffee we order. Each option is a choice, and a chance which one we will decide upon. It is the choices your parents made that brought you into the world of the living, and the choices their parents made, that brought them forward. It is the choices you then made, which has enabled each of you, twelve years of free public education you have earned.

For some, the chances to choose positive were clear, for others those chances were cloaked in a heavy layer of fog. Yet by chance, with the choices everyone in this room has made throughout their lives, has lead us all to this gathering spot, in this town, this state, this county at this very moment to congratulate and celebrate you. Choices and chances will follow us throughout our lives. We all hope that the choices we will be given, will lead to the chance for us to reach our potential, define the level of success, or find the balance and happiness all of us desire. However, history as taught us that our existence has been plagued with societies which limit choices and the chances each of us desire.

While our independence and American experience began with the promise of all having the god given rights of seeking life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, in the 242 years of our self-governing we have bared witness to the horrors of slavery, the inequality of women, the oppression of immigrants, the disparity of Jim Crow and the discrimination and violence inflicted upon our LBGT community. Summer Pet Safety

It takes only minutes for a pet left in a vehicle on a warm day to succumb to heatstroke and suffocation. Most people don't realize how hot it can get in a parked car on a balmy day. However, on a 78 degree day, temperatures in a car parked in the shade can exceed 90 degrees -- and hit a scorching 160 degrees if parked in the sun!

Even when the outside air temperature is in the 60s, temperatures inside some vehicles can reach the danger zone on bright, sunny days. So many experts recommend not leaving pets or children in parked cars even for short periods if the temperature is in the 60's or higher.

Rolling down a window or parking in the shade doesn't guarantee protection either, since temperatures can still climb into the danger zone. And if the window is rolled down sufficiently, the pet can escape. Just 15 minutes can be enough for an animal's body temperature to climb from a normal 102.5 to deadly levels that will damage the nervous and cardiovascular systems.

Information from Fire Department 692-3457

REMEMBER "Fireworks Rules"

The state of New Hampshire has rules and regulations governing the use of fireworks. These are promulgated by the State Fire Marshal. Most important among these are:

- A PERMIT must be obtained from the Fire Department
- The landowner MUST give permission to use fireworks
- Only those 21 and older should possess and use fireworks
- M-80s, cherry bombs and certain bottle rockets are illegal in New Hampshire and SHOULD NEVER BE USED
- Small firecrackers and certain bottle rockets have been legalized by the Legislature and do NOT require a Permit. Check with your Fireworks provider to be sure which ones are legal without a Permit
- Eye protection by those igniting the fireworks is recommended
- Light only ONE device at a time
- Keep spectators away
- Ignite ONLY outdoors and AWAY FROM OTHER FIREWORKS AND COMBUSTIBLES
- Keep a fire extinguisher or garden hose handy just in case
- Clean up debris later and any fireworks that failed to ignite. Soak these in water to disable them
- Call "9-1-1" for any incident no matter how small
- Contact the Fire Department if you are unsure of any procedure

Public Works Highway Personnel Pretty-up Citizen's Place

Highway personnel recently installed new perennial plantings around the monument and flag pole at Citizens Place in downtown. The new plantings compliment the public space with a variety of perennial plantings that will add to the beauty and special nature of Citizens Place.

Department Water Utility Employees Train with Emergency Responders on Mock Chemical Spill in the Salmon Falls River

Water personnel spent the day on Thursday, June 21, training with other public safety emergency responders on responding to a mock chemical spill in the Salmon Falls River. The training allowed personnel from both the City of Somersworth, City of Dover, Town of Berwick, NHDES and Maine DEP, Strafford Country EMS and York County EMS to practice installing protective river booms to protect drinking water intakes and modify water treatment plant operations at both the Town of Berwick and City of Somersworth. The training was an excellent opportunity for neighboring municipalities and State and Regional agencies to work together on methods to protect drinking water supplies.

City Announces Road Repair Plans

Following City Council approval, the City is currently soliciting construction bids from road paving contractors to repair/repave the following streets in the City:

Otis Road: West High Street to Rocky Hill Road

Salmon Falls Road: State Line to City Line

High Street: Blackwater Road to South Street Tate's Brook Road: Maple Street to Cemetery Road

Washington Street: High Street to Main Street

Constitutional Way: Washington Street to High Street Horne Street: High Street to Myrtle Street

Work on the roads will range from milling off old pavement and applying new asphalt. In some cases, it will involve a reclaiming of the existing road base and adding new pavement material. Bids are due on July 19, 2018 at 2:00 PM and will be reviewed before submitting recommendation on bid award to the City Council. Work is anticipated to begin later this summer /early fall.

New Hampshire DOT will be repaying W. High Street from Rte. 108 to Maple Street (maintained by the State) and the City will be partnering with the NHDOT contractors to overlay W. High Street from Maple Street to Cemetery Road. This work is anticipated to occur in early fall.

In accordance with RSA 466




- Puppy (3 months to 7 months (rabies vaccination is required):
 \$7.50
- Male and female dogs (not spayed or neutered): \$10.00
- Spayed Neutered Male/Female: \$7.50
- Group License for 5 or more dogs: \$20.00
- 1st Animal owned by Senior Citizen (65 or older at time of procuring license): \$2.00

In addition to the regular licensing fee listed above, the following will also be applied:

- Beginning June 1st, a late fee of \$1.00 per month will be assessed for each month during which the dog remains unlicensed. Late fees are assessed per dog.
- Each dog that remains unlicensed will be assessed with a \$25.00 Civil Forfeiture fine by July 15th.

Robert Quinlan is a seventy-year-old historian, teaching at FSU, where his wife Darla is also tenured. Their marriage, forged in war protests, now bears the fractures of time, with the couple trapped in an existence of morning coffee and solitary jogging. For Robert and Darla, the cracks remain under the surface, whereas the divisions in Robert's family are more apparent: he has no relationship with his brother, who became estranged from the family as the Vietnam War intensified. the Somersworth Public Library.




Borrow the Library's Museum Pass to the Seacoast Science Center

it was fun, active, healthy and delicious!




And this just in... Somersworth School District has been awarded a nearly \$42,000 USDA Farm to School Planning Grant! This grant was submitted back in December and was a very competitive process. Somersworth was the *only*

New Hampshire recipient. This grant will be used to (1) develop a district-wide compost and food waste reduction program, (2) provide professional

development for teachers to utilize school gardens as outdoor classrooms, (3) increase farm to school learning opportunities for students in the after-school and summer programs, and (4) develop a local foods procurement plan with the school food service department. With the help from this grant and support from our many talented teachers and administrators, garden experiences as all the schools can be fruitful and multiply. What an exciting opportunity, and we look forward to getting to work on this over the next year. Congratulations and thank you to everyone who was involved in this process!
