A Quick Note on Private Residential Dumpsters from our Property Maintenance Office

Many Somersworth residents opt to rent a private dumpster for their home out of a need for high-volume trash-removal, or simply for convenience. If you already have a dumpster on your property, or are considering one as an option for your home, please keep in mind the following dumpster regulations, City Ordinance, Ch. 11A:

- The dumpster needs to be placed on an impermeable surface, such as asphalt or concrete;
- The dumpster needs to be screened from public view;
- If visible from any public way, the screening shall be opaque, either by the
 use of trees/landscaping or man-made structures and maintained in an
 acceptable condition;
- The dumpster cannot be within any front yard setback area.

Preserving Historic Homes in Somersworth


Last part of the lecture series: Do's & Don'ts of Historic Homes





Somersworth Fire Department & Emergency Management From Telegraph to Cell Phones – the Simplicity of 9-1-1 A safety message from the Fire Chief's Office

At 8:25 p.m. on April 29, 1852, history was made when a fire was reported to the

Boston Fire Department for the first time using a fire alarm box. Box 1212 is at the corner of Endicott and Cooper Streets in the area known today as the North End. When the fire alarm box lever is pulled, the unique number of the box (identifying the street corner) is sent to the fire department via an electrical signal. In the early days, the telegraph signal would also ring the "house gongs" in each fire station where firefighters would count the sequence of gong strikes and proceed to the designated location. The fire alarm box system was developed over two decades before the invention of the telephone and was a big improvement over yelling "fire" or ringing church bells. At one time, Somersworth had a robust municipal fire alarm box system with as many as 70 locations.

Over time, the widespread availability of telephones, increasing malicious false alarms, and scarce taxpayer dollars signaled the demise of the fire alarm box system in many cities.

Today, cell phones and the enhanced 9-1-1 system that provides caller location information makes reporting emergencies faster and more effective than at any point in history. In New Hampshire, all 9-1-1 calls are received by one of two State 9-1-1 call centers. The State passes Somersworth's 9-1-1 calls to the City's dispatch center operated around the clock by the Police Department. Under normal circumstances, the SFD duty crew – consisting of a lieutenant and three firefighters - are sent to any emergency requiring a fire department response. As a result, there are times when SFD personnel are not in the fire station. However, some citizens still call the fire station to report an emergency. If you need emergency services, please call 9-1-1 to ensure a timely and coordinated emergency response.

Please see the following safety messages and pictures of recent SFD activities. Safety Considerations for Summer Rentals and Vacations.



SAFETY TIPS

- Pets are curious. They may bump into, turn on, or knock over cooking equipment. Keep pets away from stoves and countertops.
- Keep pets away from candles, lamps, and space heaters.
- Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen on a fireplace and keep it in place.
- Keep pets away from a chimney's outside vents.
 Have a "pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter)
 away from the fireplace. Glass doors and screens
 can stay dangerously hot for several hours after the
 fire goes out.
- Consider battery-operated, flameless candles.
 They can look and smell like real candles.
- Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through electrical cords. Have any problems checked by a professional.

SMOKE ALARMS

- Have working smoke alarms on every level of the home. Test your smoke alarms at least once a month.
- If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.
- Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

Pets and Wildfires

Make sure pets are included in your family's wildfire evacuation plan. Build an evacuation kit for each pet in your household. Ensure each kit is a size and weight that can be quickly and easily loaded into a vehicle when packing to evacuate.



FACT

Pets or wild animals have a part in starting about 750 home fires per year. These involve cooking equipment, fireplaces and chimneys, space heaters, lamps, bulbs, wiring, and candles.

Bagged Leaves and Brush Pickup

Brush will be picked up the third week in May. You must call 603-692-4266 by Friday, May 13 to be added to the brush collection pickup list. Please have your brush curbside no later than 7:00 am on Monday, May 16 for pickup. Brush can be up to five (5) inches in diameter and ten (10) feet long.

PLEASE NOTE: Brush pickup is limited to 20 minutes per stop. Any remaining brush and cleanup of debris is the responsibility of the property owner.

Bagged leaves will be picked up the fourth week in May. You do not have to call ahead for bagged leaves pickup. Please have leaves curbside no later than 7:00am on your trash pickup day the week May 23. Leaves and grass clippings must be in brown recyclable paper leaf bags, sold at many local stores.

The Community Garden at Malley Farm is GROWING!

The Community Gardens at Malley Farm is expanding thanks in part to a Grant received from Home Depot. City crews and garden volunteers worked with officials of the Somersworth Home Depot Store on implementing the Grant. The Garden Stewards were established in 2017 to assist with managing the program. Representatives of the Stewards led an informational and sign- up meeting for Spring 2022 participants on March 23. Participants that did not attend the recent informational meeting are asked to obtain a copy of the Community Garden Participation Application and send to the Department of Public Works. All new and returning garden volunteers must complete the application form in order to participate and assigned a garden plot in the Community Garden





The Grant received from Home Depot included a new tool shed, fencing, raised bed material for new and existing garden plots, path way improvements, and garden tools to be used by the gardeners. Somersworth and Rochester Home Depot employees volunteered to construct the improvements. In addition, Highway personnel provided the site work to accommodate the expansion and Home Depot employees were on site for a work/service day on April 20 and 21 at the Community Garden at the Malley Farm.

What's Happening at Somersworth Farm to School

Students are Back in the Garden. The arrival of spring has been long awaited, especially in the Farm to School World! Ms. Ficco's kindergarteners at Idlehurst have started seeds in the classroom in preparation for planting in the school garden beds, learning about what plants need to grow, and what food sources in nature animals depend on.

Meanwhile at Maple Wood, Ms. Wilson has spearheaded NH Harvest of the Month lessons for students in all grades, while also planning for the planting of their school gardens. Fifth graders from Ms. Weinberg's class also participated in the SMS maple tree tapping that Mr. Gerding incorporates into his 7th grade science curriculum. Nice way to prime 5th graders for entering middle school next fall!

Community partnerships are extremely helpful in integrating Farm to School into students lives. Our elementary students were invited to a seed starting activity at the Somersworth Public Library over April break, where they planted their own take-home garden kit, complete with care instructions. Thank you to our Librarians Mary and Rebecca for providing the space, and to Strafford County Mater Gardener, Judy Goodnow and Food to School Coordinator Wendy Berkeley for their time and knowledge shared with future gardeners and their families.

Our partnership with Somersworth Recreation Office and the Somersworth Youth Connection (SYC) is another boon to our gardens. This summer, the Recreation Program Kids Cap will pitch in to water, weed and care for the school gardens at Maple Wood and Malley Farm Community Garden plots, and SYC Summer Program will do the same for the Somersworth Middle School and Idelhurst gardens. This will be a huge help to our school staff who have invested much time and energy into the success of our school gardens. It will also keep our kids who planted the gardens in spring invested and involved with their care, and create a more complete and seamless gardening experience when they return to school next fall.

Gardening teaches us patience and how to care for other living thins, a lesson we all can benefit from. Remember to get outdoors, and have a safe, happy and healthy spring season.
