# Registering to Vote in New Hampshire

You can register to vote at the City Clerk's office, Monday through Friday

from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Voter registration must be done at least 7-10 days prior to any election to be on the election day checklist. These session are based on when the Supervisors of the checklist need to meet prior to the election(s) or filing period(s). Please reference the website for when the sessions are posted. The Supervisors of the Checklist session are also an additional time to register to vote. In addition, you may register to vote at the polls on election day.

A person must meet the following to register and vote in New Hampshire:

- 18 years of age or older on election day;
- A United States Citizen; and
- Domiciled in the City and/or ward where the person seeks to vote.




## Puzzle Swap Saturday, October 21 10:30 - 11:30 a.m.


# Kids Club Wednesdays at 5:30 pm Kids Club is the Library's newest program for

Little ones can enjoy age appropriate toys such as a ball pit, crawling tunnel, infant climber and activity table. Recommended for age 2 and under.











#### **Discounted Museum Passes**




### **Interlibrary Loan Program**

Too often, unused prescription drugs find their way into the wrong hands. That's dangerous and often tragic. That's why it was great to see

#### **SNOW EMERGENCY PARKING**

Permits for Noble Street and River Street parking during snow emergency parking bans will become available beginning October 1, 2023.

On January 7th, 2019, the Somersworth City Council passed Ordinance 9-19 to allow permit parking during snow emergency parking bans on Noble Street adjacent to the Noble Pines Park, and on River Street adjacent to Jules Bisson Park.

Permits to park there during parking bans resulting from a snow emergency are available from November 1st thru March 31st at a rate of \$20.00 per month, and are available at the Police Department.

There are 17 spaces available on Noble Street and 5 spaces available on River Street. Permits will be issued on a first come, first served basis. The permits are only valid during the dates listed when there is a snow emergency parking ban in effect.

Vehicles parked in this area with a valid permit must be moved by 8 am on the day following the completion of the parking ban to allow for snow removal from the designated area.

Vehicles not moved per the Ordinance will be subject to being towed at the owner's expense.

## Fire Prevention Month – "Cooking safety starts with YOU" A safety message from the Fire Chief's Office

At approximately 9:00 p.m. on October 8, 1871, a fire started on the southwest side of Chicago eventually growing into a conflagration that killed approximately 300 people, destroyed 17,500 buildings and roughly 3.3 square miles of the city, and left more than 100,000 residents homeless. In 1922, the National Fire

Protection Association (NFPA) named the second week of October Fire Prevention Week in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. The goal of Fire Prevention week and now the entire month of October is to raise fire safety awareness, and help ensure your home and family prevent fires as well as being prepared for the unexpected.

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the U.S. Consequently, this year's Fire Prevention Month theme is "Cooking safety starts with YOU". This is a good time to remind ourselves and educate our children on the dangers of cooking hazards and unattended cooking as well as the precautions we can take to prevent cooking-related fires and injuries. Almost half (44%) of reported home fires started in the kitchen. Two-thirds (66%) of home cooking fires start with the ignition of food or other cooking materials.

When cooking, stay in the kitchen, use a timer, and avoiding distractions such as electronics or the TV. Here are some steps that everyone can take to "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen."

- Never leave cooking food unattended. Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling or broiling. If you have to leave, even for a short time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.
- You have to be alert when cooking. You won't be alert if you are sleepy, have taken medicine or drugs, or consumed alcohol that makes you drowsy.
- Always keep an oven mitt and pan lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan to smother the flame. Turn off the burner, and leave the pan covered until it is completely cool. Do not use water on a grease fire. Do not put yourself in jeopardy or risk burns if the fire is too big, get everyone out and call 911 from outside.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where
  hot food or drink is prepared or carried. Avoid the use of heat producing
  plug-in cooking appliances where a child could trip over the cord and pull
  the hot food, grease or cooking oil onto themselves and cause severe
  burns.

Other important and enduring safety considerations associated with Fire Prevention month:

- Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on every level and in every bedroom.
- Test alarms regularly.
- Alarms don't last forever, remember to replace your alarms at least every 10 years.
- Unattended cooking is the #1 cause of fires in the kitchen. Be alert while cooking.
- Plan and practice an escape route with your family.
- If your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm sounds, leave the home immediately for fresh air and call 911.

Note: The categories used to report monthly incidents are those mandated by the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS). Most categories are self-explanatory. For those categories that are not obvious, the following examples can add clarity: Good Intent Call - a reported fire that turns out to be steam from a dryer vent; Severe WX/Natural Disaster - a lightning strike or tree falling on a house that requires an inspection to ensure there is no fire; and a Special Incident - low frequency event such as a citizen's complaint of an ordinance or code violation.

For the most recent reporting period of May, 2023, Stewart's Ambulance responded to 187 emergency calls in the City, transported on 123 of those calls, and had an average response time of three minutes and fifty-two seconds (03.52). A mutual aid ambulance was required to respond into the City seven (7) times during the reporting period.

Note: The SFD responds with Stewart's on the more serious medical calls and any time a mutual aid ambulance responds into the City. In addition, FD EMTs and AEMTs assist Stewart's with transports when a driver and/or additional EMS providers are required.



# Do's & Don'ts

Fire Prevention Week is October 4 - 10, 2015 to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire of 1871.

#### DO

Keep a smoke alarm on every level of your home.



Half of home fire deaths happen between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. Stay safe with smoke alarms outside of every bedroom and each separate sleeping area.

#### DONT



The risk of dying in a home fire is cut in half in homes with working smoke alarms. If your alarm doesn't sound when tested, it's time to replace it.

DONT

#### DO

Ensure your eyeglasses, hearing aid, cane or wheelchair are next to your bed to quickly grab if necessary.



If there is a fire, you may have less than 3 minutes to get out of your home. Be ready to act immediately.



If you test the alarm and can't hear it, consider getting a strobe light that will flash or a bed shaker that will shake when the smoke alarm sounds.

DONT

Stop to call 911 until you're safely outside and away from the fire danger.

#### DO

Make a fire escape plan that shows 2 ways out of every room.



# Residential Solid Waste and Recycling Collection Services -7am set outs:

Residents are asked to set out trash bags and recycling bins during their weekly collections no later than 7am on the day of collection.

THERE WILL BE NO DELAY IN TRASH/RECYCLING COLLECTIONS IN OCTOBER FOR Columbus Day/Indigenous

Peoples Day, Monday October 9.

**Non- Metal Bulky Waste Disposal**: Please get "Bulky Waste" Stickers All non-metal bulky waste items require "Bulky Waste" Stickers. These

All non-metal bulky waste items require "Bulky Waste" Stickers. These stickers cost \$4.00/per 50lbs and can be purchased at City Hall or the Department of Public Works (checks only). Non-Metal Bulky items will be collected by Waste Management and must be placed curbside by 7:00am on your normal trash collection day with the appropriate amount of Bulky Waste Stickers visible to the Waste Management driver.

Residents are reminded that items set out for collection without Bulky Waste Stickers will not be collected. Bulky items left in front of your property set out without bulky stickers are subject to code violations for a property non-compliance, Bulky Waste stickers can be purchased at City using checks, cash or credit/debit cards. Stickers may

also be purchased at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane with checks only. Each sticker is \$4.00.

#### **Metal Pick-up**

The Department of Public Works reminds residents that metal pick up occurs on the 2nd Tuesday of the month. The October collection will occur on Tuesday, October 10. Residents wanting this service are asked to call Public Works **no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, October 9** to be placed on the pickup schedule for October. Participants are reminded to place the proper number of tags on the item when setting the item out on the street for collection. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00. Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30am-2:30pm Monday –Friday.

#### **Brush and Bagged Leaves Collection:**

Public Works Highway crews will start collecting residential brush during the week of October 16th through 20th. Residents need to call Public Works at 692-4266 by Friday, October 13th to be placed on the pick-up list. Please note, in order to be served, brush can be up to five (5) inches in diameter and ten (10) feet long.

Department Highway crews will also be collecting bagged leaves the week of October 23rd through 27th. Residents should place their bagged leaves curbside on their regular trash pick-up day. The paper leaf bags can be purchased at grocery store chains, hardware stores, and Home Depot.

# Driveway, Obstruction & Trench Opening Permit Reminder-Winter Moratorium takes effect November 15-April 15.

As a reminder, any work done within the Right-Of-Way requires a permit. Examples include resurfacing or rebuilding your driveway, with a new driveway apron connecting to the streets, street openings for utility connections and if occupying a street or sidewalk with staging or roll- off for debris removal /property repairs. The annual winter moratorium is not too far off and takes effect from November 15-April 15; prohibiting any excavating in the ROW during this period. #### Water Mains to be flushed in October

The Water Distribution Division staff will be conducting night time hydrant flushing on high traffic streets starting on Sunday, October 1, 2023 through Thursday, October 5, 2023 6:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m. Day time hydrant flushing will continue the following week, October 9-12 as needed, on local streets until complete.

This routine maintenance program helps to maintain water quality throughout the water distribution system. Water main flushing can cause a temporary discoloration of your water supply. If you do experience discoloration, please run a cold water tap for a short time to clear your water.

### **MS4 Stormwater Compliance Information**

The US EPA MS-4 Stormwater Permit was issued in January, 2017. The permit covers stormwater discharges into waterways in urbanized portions of New Hampshire, and

requires identification of illicit discharges and mitigation of non-point source pollution. The permit came into effect on July 1, 2018. Timelines contained in the permit required the City to issue a Notice of Intent (NOI) indicating our plans to comply with permit requirements, and development of a Stormwater Management Program (SWMP) that implements the tasks outlined in the NOI. The goal of the program is to address non-point source (storm water run-off) pollution of our waterways, and to adopt measures that will protect and enhance water quality. # DIY Halloween Scarecrow

# Use your yard waste to stuff your scarecrow!



#### **Materials:**

- Twine
- Scissors
- Old boots
- Straw hat
- Yard stick
- Old pillow case
- Old pants/overalls
- 5 gallon paint stick
- · Yard waste/grass clippings
- Old long sleeve shirt/flannel



Dumping yard waste in our local waterbodies is detrimental to our environment. Protect our waters by either composting it, leaving grass clippings on your lawn for a natural fertilizer, or bringing it to a place that can mulch it.

3. (Optional) Draw a face on the pillow case in permanent marker. Wrap the pillow case around the top of the yard stick, stuff, and tie together with twine. Top with the straw hat, give your scarecrow their boots, and display outside.



## **Directions:**

1. Create backbone/shoulders by placing the yard stick vertically on a flat surface and centering the paint stick horizontally at the 8 inch mark. Secure with twine.



2. Dress and stuff your scarecrow. Begin with the shirt and tuck it into the pants or overalls. Stuff the scarecrow with your yard waste scraps and supplement if needed with straw. Tie the sleeves and pant legs with twine.

### **Materials:**



- TwineScissors
  - 8 pinecones
  - Hot glue gun
  - Embroidery hoop
  - · Leaves with intact stems
  - 8, 3-foot long waxed strings



## **Directions:**


- 1. Collect leaves with intact stems and press in a heavy book for a few days.
- 2. Wrap twine around the embroidery hoop, securing the ends with hot glue.
- 3. Tie the 8, 3-foot long waxed strings at even intervals around the hoop.



- Attach pinecones to the bottom of the waxed strings to act as weights.
- 5. Knot the string around each stem, creating randomized spacing.
- Secure the hoop to a ceiling hook using twine.






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
