

## ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by His Honor, the Mayor, Dana S. Hilliard and, upon roll call, the following Council members were present: Pepin, Vincent, Dumont, Austin, Michaud, Witham, Gerding, Cameron and Paradis.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Councilor Vincent led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### PUBLIC HEARING

A. Ordinance No. 15-21 – To Amend Chapter 7, Solid Waste and Recycling, Section 7.4 – Fees

No comments were made by the Public.

B. Ordinance No. 16-21 – Supplemental Appropriation for an Amendment to the Wright-Pierce Contract for the Engineering and Design of the Main Street and Constitutional Way Complete Streets Projects

There were no opening comments by visitors.

#### **CONSENT CALENDAR**

Approve minutes of the City Council Meeting on May 3, 2021

Councilor Austin made a motion to approve all items in the Consent Calendar. The motion was seconded by Councilor Vincent and passed 9-0.

#### COMMENTS BY CITY COUNCILORS

*Councilor Paradis* stated last month, New Hampshire saw a record high in home sales and said Somersworth is at high risk for gentrification. She stated the City needs to begin the process of digging deep into housing issues and should garner input for potential anti-gentrification legislation. Paradis stated a regional approach to the housing issue would be best and requested a task force be created as a start to the process.

A. Presentation by Attorney Katherine Miller, Special Counsel for Cable Franchise Agreements

Ms. Miller presented information to Council regarding cable franchise agreements. She said the current agreement with Comcast is due for renewal, but has a three-year window. Competitor, Atlantic Broad Band would also like to seek a franchise agreement with the City of Somersworth within the next six months. Ms. Miller suggested the City consider both options on the 6-month timeline and also reminded Council of the limited topics of negotiation. Councilor Vincent asked if both companies will be granted the same deal. Ms. Miller said the document would be the same and the financial obligations would be fairly even. Manager Belmore reiterated the point that if a franchise agreement was reached with Atlantic Broadband, the City would then have two franchise agreements (Comcast and Atlantic Broadband). Councilor Witham asked if his assumption was correct that the infrastructure for Atlantic Broadband did not have to be constructed prior to an agreement being reached. Ms. Miller stated Councilor Witham's assumption is correct and that Atlantic Broadband is eager to reach an agreement so they can then begin construction. Manager Belmore stated that in regards to the ascertainment of future cable related needs to meet the deadline for the Federal law, the City of Somersworth is starting the renewal process with Comcast. The recommendation is for the City Council to note on the record that the City is currently in negotiations with two cable companies who plan to provide services to City residents. The Council is now soliciting comments and other information from residents in regards to their cable television needs. Manager Belmore stated the City does not have the ability to regulate phone or internet, though Comcast currently offers those services and it is likely Atlantic Broadband will want to as well. Belmore noted that the City expects to reach agreements with both in the near future. Councilor Paradis and Dumont both voiced their support for competition for cable services in the City.

B. Presentation of Financial Statements for year ending June 30, 2020 by Plodzik & Sanderson

Tyler Paine, C.P.A and Mike Campo, C.P.A from Plodzik & Sanderson, P.A gave a presentation on the financial statements from the latest audit of year ending June 30, 2020. Councilor Dumont asked a question regarding a deficit in the NHRS pension plan and a projection of the City's future standing with the plan. Councilor Paradis inquired about the change in net position.

Ed Levasseur, 44 Pleasant Street, voiced his support for increased efforts for the Arts within the City of Somersworth.

#### **CLOSING COMMENTS BY COUNCIL MEMBERS**

*Councilor Pepin* stated his intention to run again for City Councilor for one more term if there is support to do so. He said it has been a pleasure to serve and has a few other things he would like to accomplish and stated he will continue to give 100% if given the opportunity to do so.

*Councilor Vincent* expressed his discontent with the condition of the Mural on a building in the City and his support for the Arts.

*Councilor Dumont* expressed his gratitude to the Fire Department and applauded their response to the recent fire on Linden Street. He also thanked the Police, Ambulance, and Public Works department for doing a great job. Dumont said he is also happy to see the POW flag waving at Citizen's Place. He mentioned he saw a lot of dust while passing the dog park and inquired about improving the turf. Dumont said Malley Farm's fields look great, but the structures do not. He also mentioned that the flag located at that park should either be taken down at night or lit up per proper flag procedure. Councilor Dumont echoed comments by Councilor Paradis on current issues with housing and said the Economic Development Committee should be charged with the task of looking into solutions for issues on the topic. He mentioned that the price of building materials has risen drastically recently and that ROI for developers is going down due to this. Councilor Dumont mentioned that the fence at the Forest Glade Cemetery is in disrepair and has concerns of the cleanup of the cemetery for Memorial Day.

*Councilor Austin* thanked Chief Kramlinger for his efforts in a well-coordinated response to the recent fire on Linden Street. He said he appreciates the Mayor bringing up the topic of mask wearing and that it is becoming a personal choice. He said he hopes people are mindful of their setting and audience when making their decision. Austin mentioned that sometimes the true meaning of Memorial Day can be lost and urges people to remember the holiday is about the lives lost in protecting this Country. He urged people to attend one of the many events going on that day in remembrance of those lives lost.

*Councilor Michaud* thanked the City's first responders for their recent efforts. He also thanked Director Bobinsky for his work and congratulated him on his recent proclamation. Michaud also thanked the City Manager and City staff and said he always hears how friendly everyone is that works in City Hall. Michaud wished everyone a Happy Memorial Day.

*Councilor Gerding* said he is very happy with the way our Public Works and Public Safety departments operate. He said he is very excited for the Cemetery Road project to begin and gave a shout out to the ICC (Indonesian Community Connect) for their recent opening.

*Councilor Cameron* said she is happy that all of our service providers go above and beyond. She also mentioned it was really nice to see a little league game being played on her way over to the meeting as a sign of normalcy. Cameron thanked Councilors Paradis and Dumont for their comments on the

housing issue and also gave a shout out to Patriot Tractor and Truck. She said she felt very welcomed at the recent ICC opening and said Happy Memorial Day to everyone.

*Councilor Paradis* gave a shout out to little Indonesia and said they will bring a lot to our downtown. She said the turf at the dog park looks great and is looking forward to the benches being installed. Councilor Paradis gave kudos to everyone in Public Safety. She said about 34% of new home sales in New Hampshire have been out of state residents, some avoiding capital gains tax. She hopes Somersworth can get creative to keep residents, specifically seniors, in their homes.

Councilor Vincent made a motion to adjourn the City Council meeting. The motion was seconded by Councilor Paradis and passed 9-0. The meeting adjourned at 8:35 p.m.

	TO AMEND CHAPTER 7, SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING, SECTION 7.4 - FEES

May 3, 2021

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOMERSWORTH THAT the Ordinances of the City of Somersworth as amended, be further amended as follows:

Amend Chapter 7, Solid Waste and Recycling, Section 7.4 – Fees, by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

<u>Section 7.4 – Fees:</u> Effective July 1, 2021, the retail cost of the bags shall be \$2.15 for a 30-gallon bag and \$1.60 for a 15-gallon bag. Ten cents (.10) from the sale of each bag shall be utilized to subsidize the cost to the City for recycling or for any other cost related to solid waste and recycling collection and disposal. The cost to vendors shall be \$.02 cents less to provide financial incentive for selling the bags.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.


