Our first application has been submitted and we are awaiting final official word of approval. If approval Somersworth will receive a State Historical marker identifying the Hilltop School property as the home of the first public High School in the state of NH. I would like to thank Jenne Holmes for all of her work on this project. I look forward to hopefully reporting officially communication from the state during our August meeting.

After hearing official word the Mayors office will proceed forward in submitting the second application to identify Forrest Glad cemetery. Both properties that we have applied for are on the US and State historic registry.

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Finance Committee – Councilor Witham stated the Finance Committee last met on June 23rd at 4:30 and discussed the emergency repair needed for Engine #3. Councilor Witham mentioned that all Committee Members were present at the meeting. Councilor Witham stated that there was an unexpected catastrophic failure in the engine, and it needs to be replaced. The cost for the repair is \$39,387.00 and the Committee approved to move forward with this repair not to exceed \$50,000.00, allowing for some contingency funding. The repair will begin in July.

Councilor Witham informed the Committee that the City Staff attended Cyber Training from a Homeland Security Representative and a Primex Representative.

Councilor Witham mentioned the Committee discussed ARPA money that is available for the Complete Streets Project which is in the design engineering phase, these funds would be for water and sewer components of the projects but the Council would have to give approval for committing funding and the City may not be in the position to commit this year.

Government Operations Committee – Councilor Michaud stated they last met on June 30th and discussed employee retention and recruitment. Councilor Michaud mentioned that the idea of adding steps and a few other ideas that staff will look into and come back to the next meeting on August 3rd with more information.

Public Safety – Councilor Pepin stated that they discussed the repair of Engine #3 and mentioned that Councilor Witham gave an accurate account of the status of Engine #3. Councilor Pepin also stated that the new pumper will be arriving in about 4 months; Engine #3 will then become the backup engine so that is why the repair is needed.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES, CITY OFFICERS AND CITY MANAGER

Fire Station Building Committee – Councilor Pepin stated they met on June 23rd and discussed the proposed change order list from Fire Chief Kramlinger which included an additional window area and red globe lights at the main entrance which the Committee supported provided these are not cost prohibitive. Some change order items saved money and some have a cost. Councilor Pepin also mentioned that the training tower grant funds have not been received yet and there are concerns on the cost of the training tower.

Unfinished Business (under Section 14 of Agenda)

Resolution

- A. Resolution No. 45-22: To Authorize the City Manager to Enter into an Additional Grant Agreement with the New Hampshire Department of Justice for a Project Safe Neighborhood Grant. Again, the Public Safety Committee met on June 8 and voted to support this Grant and to sponsor a Resolution for full Council consideration.
- B. Resolution No. 46-22: To Authorize the City Manager to Apply for a Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Site-Based Program (COSSAP) Grant through the New Hampshire Department of Justice and to Accept the Grant Award. The Public Safety Committee also voted to support this Grant action item. Again, funding will be used for Officer training and additional overtime that focuses on forming relationships with local Mental Health, Substance Use, Medical and other Community organizations to help provide resources for people in need of recovery services. It also compliments our ACERT (Adverse Child Experience Response Team) initiative.

Resolutions

- A. Resolution No. 1-23: To Authorize the City Manager to Sign an Agreement with the State of New Hampshire, Division of Historical Resources for the Installation of a Historical Marker and for the City to Agree to Provide Maintenance and Care of Said Marker. Eric Chinburg Properties has agreed to pay \$1,200. of the cost of the marker; the State website indicates the markers cost between \$2,000. \$2,300.
- B. Resolution No. 2-23: Naming Patriots Way and Assigning Addresses, as required. Attached is a copy of the June 21, 2022, E911 Committee meeting when the vote was taken to recommend the naming of these two roads.
- C. Resolution No. 3-23: Naming Valley Lane and Assigning Addresses, as required.
- **D.** Resolution No. 4-23: To Discontinue the Sidewalk Improvement Capital Reserve Fund in Accordance with RSA 34:11-A. The possibility of taking this action was raised as a possibility by Councilor Witham during this past fiscal year as City Council appropriated \$100,000 in the present fiscal year that started July 1, 2022. The CIP for FY2023-2028 recommends adding an additional \$10,000 each year to this amount so that incrementally the amount for FY 2028 is \$150,000. In accordance with State Law, the Council will need to hold a Public Hearing prior to the vote, which could be scheduled at the next regular meeting of Council on Monday, August 1, 2022.

Mayor Dana S. Hilliard scheduled the Public Hearing for Resolution No. 4-23 for Monday August 1, 2022 during the City Council Meeting.

Other

A. Vote to Accept the Proposed Charter Amendments from the Ward Boundaries Committee, and to Accept the Opinion of the City Attorney and to Place the Proposed Charter Amendments before the Voters at the September 13, 2022 Election. Attached is a copy of City Attorney's opinion that the proposed amendments' language complies with State Law and the State Constitution. If approved, the City Clerk will be sending the proposed amendments to the proper State Agencies as outlined in the City Attorney's opinion letter.

Councilor Gerding made a motion to appoint Will Milus as a Moderator for Ward 5. The motion was seconded by Councilor Michaud and passed by voice vote.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

RESOLUTIONS

A. **Resolution No. 45-22** – To Authorize the City Manager to Enter into an Additional Grant Agreement with the New Hampshire Department of Justice for a Project Safe Neighborhood Grant

Councilor Messier made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 45-22. The motion was seconded by Councilor Vincent.

Discussion:

Councilor Witham stated he read the Public Safety Meeting Minutes and the Resolution and he is not sure what the intent is. City Manager Belmore stated that this will allow for extra patrols in "hot spot" areas around the City and since there have been some issues at Jules Bisson Park River Street, this area has been added to patrol areas. Councilor Witham confirmed that this would be an additional Patrol using overtime and Manager Belmore confirmed that it will be for overtime. Councilor Witham inquired about a list of "hot spot" streets, Manager Belmore stated he doesn't recall a list of streets being given at the Public Safety Meeting. Mayor Dana S. Hilliard stated that he recalls from a few years ago that the triangular area of Franklin, Union, and Main Street having the most calls for service and believes this is the "hot spot" area.

Councilor Messier understands that this would be for the overtime used for these specific patrols.

The motion passed 8-1 Councilor Witham opposed.

B. **Resolution No. 46-22** – To Authorize the City Manager to Apply for a Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Site-Based Program (COSSAP) Grant through the New Hampshire Department of Justice and to Accept the Grant Award

Councilor Vincent made a motion to approve Resolution No. 46-22. The motion was seconded by Councilor Pepin.

Discussion:

Councilor Vincent asked if the City Manager could give an overview for the public. City Manager Belmore stated the New Hampshire Department of Justice is providing grant funding for Police Departments under the Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Site-Based Program (COSSAP) for training overtime pay to enhance and expand the prevention, enforcement and treatment of substance abuse. Manager Belmore mentioned that this coincides with the Adverse Child Experience Response Team (ACERT)Program.

Councilor Witham expressed his concern with accepting more grant money for an already short staffed department to generate more overtime.

Councilor Messier mentioned that the overtime line item in the budget was not all used and \$50,000.00 was given back and feels that the issue with the overtime is not valid.

Councilor Gerding was under the impression the ACERT Program was put on pause due to the pandemic and inquired about this grant allowing that program to continue. City Manager Belmore understands that it would but is not certain of that.

Councilor Witham stated that this is not about the overtime expense it's about not having enough people to do the work.

Councilor Pepin stated that while listening to Police Chief McLin during the Committee meeting he understood it to be beneficial training for our officers and the officers would go to this training using overtime. The training would help our officers know how to help these people by knowing where to send them to get the help they need.

Councilor Dumont stated that he feels we are chasing the problem but not solving the problem. Councilor Dumont agrees that the training is needed but also feels that Councilor Witham brings up a good point with the short staffing problem.

City Manager Belmore stated that this is a 3-year grant so the funds will be distributed when the overtime is used for this Grant including the training.

Councilor Vincent stated that this Resolution states that it is to apply for the grant so we may not receive the funds.

Councilor Austin mentioned that in the past it has been mentioned to equip our staff with the proper training and this gives us the ability to do that and get reimbursed for doing so.

City Manager Belmore clarified that this is to apply and accept the Grant at the same time.

The motion passed 8-1 Councilor Witham opposed.

NEW BUSINESS

A. **Resolution No. 1-23** – To Authorize the City Manager to Sign an Agreement with the State of New Hampshire, Division of Historical Resources for the Installation of a Historical Marker and for the City to Agree to Provide Maintenance and Care of Said Marker

Councilor Vincent would like to be an additional sponsor.

Resolution No. 1-23 will remain in first reading until call of the Chair.

B. Resolution No. 2-23 – Naming Patriots Way and Assigning Addresses, as Required

Councilor Pepin made a motion to waive Council Rules to allow for a second reading of Resolution No. 2-23. The motion was seconded by Councilor Vincent and passed by voice vote. Clerk Ramsey performed a seconded reading of Resolution No. 2-23.

Councilor Pepin made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 2-23. The motion was seconded by Councilor Vincent.

Discussion:

Councilor Pepin stated the reason he wanted to waive the rules and have a second reading is because they are ready to start construction and are in need of a Building Permit and that a permit cannot be issued until the road is named.

Councilor Witham stated that this is the road that goes up by Stewarts Ambulance and the dance studio and that the Planning Board approved a storage facility going up in there that has fence all around the property. Councilor Witham inquired about the reason of naming the road being because they are not able to get a building permit. Councilor Pepin stated that when the third building was approved by the City, the property owner is required to name the street.

Councilor Dumont inquired about the E-911 standards for naming a street and if the rules have changed, because he recalls his street having to be renamed because it sounded close to another street in the City and could be mixed up when announced over a radio. Councilor Pepin mentioned that this was sent to Concord for approval, and does not know of another street that sounds the same.

Councilor Messier stated that this is just naming a street because it is going to have a third building on the road.

The motion passed by 8-1 Councilor Dumont opposes.

C. Resolution No. 3-23 – Naming Valley Lane and Assigning Addresses, as Required

Councilor Pepin made a motion to waive Council Rules to allow for a second reading of Resolution No. 3-23. The motion was seconded by Councilor Vincent and passed by voice vote. Clerk Ramsey performed a seconded reading of Resolution No. 3-23.

Councilor Vincent made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 3-23. The motion was seconded by Councilor Pepin.

Discussion:

Councilor Vincent stated that he wished this street was named after Paul Vallee the former Fire Chief.

Councilor Messier asked if this was by the Carlton Spencer Development and City Manager Belmore confirmed that is correct.

Councilor Witham stated he is not supporting the second reading because the road is not built yet and is not sure why there is a hurry to do this.

And passed 9-0.

D. **Resolution No. 4-23** – To Discontinue the Sidewalk Improvement Capital Reserve Fund in Accordance with RSA 34:11-A

Resolution No. 4-23 will remain in first reading until call of the Chair.

OTHER

A. Vote to Accept the Proposed Charter Amendments from the Ward Boundaries Committee, and to Accept the Opinion of the City Attorney and to Place the Proposed Charter Amendments before the Voters at the September 13, 2022 Election

Discussion:

Councilor Witham inquired if this passed on September 13th if this would take effect right away and the change would be implemented for the November 8th election. Mayor Dana S. Hilliard stated that unless there is an effective date specified it usually takes effect immediately. Mayor Hilliard stated he is not an attorney and this is his guess based on the way legislation is normally implemented.

Councilor Dumont expressed his concern for voters that this change will affect and is wondering if the City will notify the voters that will be voting at a different polling location. Mayor Dana S. Hilliard stated that the affected voters will be notified.

Councilor Austin inquired if there are any timing requirements from the State or if this is something the City can take some time to decide. Mayor Dana S. Hilliard mentioned that the Districts have been set by the State and the City of Somersworth is all in one District now.

Councilor Witham expressed his concern of the time frame after the September election to notify the registered voters but if City Staff feels they can accomplish this task in that time frame, then he is ok with it taking effect right away.

Councilor Gerding inquired about the switching of polling places for a few hundred voters and potential confusion to get to the correct polling location to vote. Mayor Dana S. Hilliard explained that the Primary is when the voters vote for the candidates that they would like on

the General Election Ballot. Mayor Hilliard also explained that the change in polling places for the voters effected will not change the candidates on the ballot and that the ballot will be the same for the entire City.

City Manager Belmore mentioned that this vote is basically approve placing the Ward Boundary Amendments on the ballot for the citizens to vote on in September, therefor could the Council decide on its effective date, should it pass by the votes, at the next meeting. Mayor Hilliard concurred. Manager Belmore stated he will have the answer regarding the effective date for the August 1st City council meeting.

Councilor Messier expressed his concern to inform the voter where they need to vote.

Mayor Dana S. Hilliard called for a vote to Accept the Proposed Charter Amendments from the Ward Boundaries Committee, and to Accept the Opinion of the City Attorney and to Place the Proposed Charter Amendments before the Voters at the September 13, 2022 Election. The City Council approved this action by voice vote.

COMMENTS BY VISITORS

There were none.

CLOSING COMMENTS BY COUNCIL MEMBERS

Councilor Austin stated he heard this morning that there have been 330 mass shootings in the United Stated so far this year, and mentioned that we are fortunate to not have many instances here but we are not immune and hopes that something is done to prevent these tragedies.

Councilor Witham gave his condolences to Anne DeSerres family because she passed away, and mentioned she was a former City Councilor. Councilor Witham also mentioned that Eversource will be doubling their rates as of August 1st and the PUC has agreed with that request.

Councilor Witham also expressed his displeasure with Eversource and the status of double poles around the City and them not being taken care of in a timely manner. Councilor Witham stated that the tree trimming contractors that Eversource hired by the name Wright Tree Service left all the debris from trimming behind and the City has called and some of the debris was taken care of but it was not totally cleaned up.

Councilor Witham mentioned that Breezeline has been around the City putting up their technology and they have various ways they handle traffic control and some are not safe for motorist passing and hopes that someone can reach out to them to address this issue.

Councilor Witham also mentioned that some of the sporting fields around the High School are in need of some attention so when the fall sports start, they can be in better shape.

Councilor Witham has received some emails as well concerning flags, one is concerning putting up a flag at the National Guard Armory, but not having a light there is improper which brings up a concern about the other places in the City that have flags but no illumination at night. Another concern brought forward was when the flags should be at half-staff. Councilor Witham mentioned that maybe the Government Operations Committee can look into the policy that the City has and address those concerns that were mentioned to him.

Councilor Gerding saw a news report concerning a 100-million-dollar grant for housing going into effect on Monday and would like to put it on the radar of the City because he feels that the City could benefit from the grant. Councilor Gerding mentioned that the funds will go towards speeding up the permitting process, updating Zoning Ordinances, and demolishing vacant buildings. Councilor Gerding also mentioned that he would be interested in assisting in the process of changing the Zoning Ordinance because he recalls this being mentioned in a goal setting session.

Councilor Messier mentioned that Forest Glade Cemetery has some spots that do not look as nice as others.

Councilor Messier also stated that in reading the Government Operations Minutes it seems that staffing issues are the sign of the times as it is everywhere and feels that we should really look into ways to retain and recruit employees.

ADJOURNMENT

Councilor Michaud made a motion to adjourn the City Council meeting. The motion was seconded by Councilor Gerding and passed by voice vote. The meeting adjourned at 8:22 p.m.

City Manager Belmore stated the New Hampshire Department of Justice is providing grant funding for Police Departments under the Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Site-Based Program (COSSAP) for training overtime pay to enhance and expand the prevention, enforcement and treatment of substance abuse. Manager Belmore mentioned that this coincides with the Adverse Child Experience Response Team (ACERT)Program.

Councilor Witham expressed his concern with accepting more grant money for an already short staffed department to generate more overtime.

Councilor Messier mentioned that the overtime line item in the budget was not all used and \$50,000.00 was given back and feels that the issue with the overtime is not valid.

Councilor Gerding was under the impression the ACERT Program was put on pause due to the pandemic and inquired about this grant allowing that program to continue. City Manager Belmore understands that it would but is not certain of that.

Councilor Witham stated that this is not about the overtime expense it's about not having enough people to do the work.

Councilor Pepin stated that while listening to Police Chief McLin during the Committee meeting he understood it to be beneficial training for our officers and the officers would go to this training using overtime. The training would help our officers know how to help these people by knowing where to send them to get the help they need.

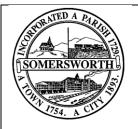
