#### **ROLL CALL OF MEMBERS**

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor Dana S. Hilliard and, upon roll call, the following Council members were present: Pepin, Gibson, Austin, Michaud, Witham, Gerding, Cameron, and Messier.

#### **MAYOR'S REPORT**

### Mayors Report for City Council Meeting October 3, 2022

Congratulations to the newest member of our team Robert Gibson. Bob comes to this Council with a distinguish record of service on the Somersworth School Board and various boards and commissions. Bob, we look forward to your knowledge and experience helping to strengthen our team approach to governing and aiding Somersworth to remain "On the Move!"

The strength of our Hilltopper community continues to shine with our commitment to cultural diversity. Congratulations to our two new members of the Somersworth Police Department from the Laotian and Indonesian community. The changing face our of Police Department continues to reflect our city motto of "Proud Past" and "Bright Future" as Somersworth lives by its reputation as NH Welcoming City.

#### REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Finance Committee - Councilor Witham stated the Committee last met on September 28th and reviewed and supported the School District's request for a supplemental appropriation form the extraordinary needs grant in the amount of \$262k to be used for security and ADA enhancements. The Committee also voted to support the City's investment policy without any changes. The Committee reviewed the work of the Government Operations Committee regarding recruitment and retention and decided to forgo a decision. Councilor Witham stated that presently the Oaks Golf Course receives a discounted rate of 2% off City water rates as the water they obtain from a well on Rocky Hill Road is not potable and the Committee was asked by the Oaks management to review and consider adjusting the discount. After discussion, the Committee voted to sponsor a Resolution to amend the Agreement with the Oaks Golf Course to provide a 35% discount on the non-potable water they obtain from the well on Rocky Hill Road. He also stated that a budget forecast shows the potential for the Fire Department budget to be overspent by around \$100,000 at the end of the fiscal year. Councilor Witham also reported that the Police Department received a grant for \$8,200 towards 20 new bullet-proof vests which the Committee approved moving forward to accept. The Committee also unanimously approved sponsoring a Resolution to accept a Community Outreach and Betterment grant for \$20,000 with a \$5,000 soft match for presentations to spread awareness of scams to the elderly of Somersworth. Councilor Witham stated that previously the Committee approved the repair of a boiler at the Police Station, however, the new boiler does not communicate with the old therefore a second boiler replacement is necessary. The Committee voted to approve the repair for an amount not to exceed \$40,000.

Government Operations – Councilor Michaud stated the Committee met on September 22 and reviewed and supported a Resolution cleaning up the Welfare guidelines for the City. The changes were mostly housekeeping and the only financial change was increasing burial assistance. The Committee also reviewed the Indigenous Peoples' statement being proposed and deferred until their next meeting until they had more information regarding the accuracy of the statements to be read. Councilor Michaud stated the Committee also had a robust conversation regarding retention bonuses for certified police officers and approved supporting a \$6,000 retention bonus pending review from the Finance Committee. Councilor Gerding stated that the Committee met on September 28 and had the author of the statement present to answer questions regarding the accuracy of the statement. Kathleen Blake, a member of the New Hampshire Indigenous Collaborative Collective confirmed the accuracy of the statements and recommended reading the statement at all City Council meetings. The Committee voted unanimously to support the Resolution dictating the statement be read at every Council meeting.

Public Safety – Councilor Pepin stated the Committee met last on September 28 and sponsored a Resolution to modify Section 4 of the Stewart's Ambulance Services, Inc. contract with the City of Somersworth to indefinitely waive the CAAS accreditation requirement. The waiver request is due to staffing shortages and the expense that comes along with maintaining accreditation. The Committee heard from Fire Chief Kramlinger who stated the department's fleet is up to full-service after a Public Works mechanic helped save thousands of dollars on a repair to one of the apparatuses. The

Committee heard updates on staffing and voted to support one Resolution for a highway safety grant and another for community outreach and betterment.

#### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES, CITY OFFICERS AND CITY MANAGER

School Board – Councilor Austin attended the latest School Board meeting where the Superintendent reported Covid numbers have stabilized within the school department and the administrator presented goals and plans for the year.

#### Resolutions

The Government Operations Committee met on September 28<sup>th</sup> and is recommending passage as presented. An Amendment to the actual language may be presented at the meeting.

New Business (under Section 15 of Agenda)

#### **Ordinances**

- A. Ordinance No. 4-23: To Amend Chapter 10, Welfare Guidelines. The Government Operations Committee met on September 22<sup>nd</sup> and voted to support the Guideline changes. Welfare Officer, Kristen LaPanne has been comparing the City's current guidelines against current model guidelines provided by the NH Municipal Association and the NH Local Welfare Association. Most of these changes are housekeeping in nature to keep up with current vernacular found at the State level. The only financial change is increasing the burial assistance amount from \$650 to \$750. Please note: The City's Welfare Guidelines were last amended in 2015. Attached is a *red-line* of these changes. I recommend a Public Hearing at the next regular Council meeting on October 17<sup>th</sup>.
- **B.** Ordinance No. 5-23: To Amend Chapter 8A, Sewerage Committee Article XIV. The Government Operations Committee met on September 22<sup>nd</sup> and voted to support

amending the Sewerage Committee section of the Ordinance. Attached is a *red-line* of these changes. I recommend a Public Hearing at the next regular Council meeting on October 17<sup>th</sup>.

**C.** Ordinance No. 6-23: Supplemental Appropriation for Capital Improvements Projects for the School Department. The Finance Committee voted at their September 28<sup>th</sup> meeting to recommend this Supplemental Appropriation. Attached is a copy of documents from the SAU office. The Memorandum to the Finance Committee provided details on how the funding would be spent. As required by the City Charter, a Public Hearing should be scheduled for the next City Council meeting on October 17<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm.

#### Other

**A.** Vote to Re-adopt the City of Somersworth Investment Policy. This is an annual housekeeping action item for the City Council. City Staff supports re-adoption without any amendments. The Finance Committee met on September 28<sup>th</sup> and recommends readoption. Attached is a copy of the City Investment Policy.

#### **Informational Items**

**A.** Bulletproof Vest Grant. We were recently notified that we were awarded \$8,525 for the purchase of 20 Bulletproof vests. The Grant is 50% of the purchase price of \$17,050. Both the Public Safety Committee and the Finance Committee discussed my acceptance of the Grant funds on behalf of the City.

Councilor Witham gave a shout out to the Police Department for their handling of a mental health call recently. He also complimented the Fire Department for containing a fire on Green Street in a congested area. He also mentioned great work in regards to repairs at the basketball court at Noble Pines Park. He also pointed to a potential issue with the crosswalk at Cemetery Road crossing West High Street.

Councilor Gerding thanked the Fire Department and Police Department also. He stated he was proud of how the police handled the mental health call. He also said that a speed limit sign on Drew Road may serve that area well as he has seen many people speeding in the area.

Councilor Cameron also welcomed Councilor Gibson and thanked the Fire Department and Police Department for their hard work.

Mayor Hilliard stated he was proud of the first two members of the Asian American community joining the Somersworth Police Department. He said that with an 8-0 vote, this Council also voted to acknowledge the history of those who settled this area first. This, he stated, shows the City of Somersworth's unwavering commitment to celebrating all and showing that diversity is a strength of our Community.

Amend Section 7 Order of Business by adding a new Section 3 as follows, and renumber the following Sections accordingly:

3. Recognition of Indigenous People – Our Native Ancestral Americans

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOMERSWORTH THAT the Council Rules and Regulations are amended effective upon passage of this Resolution.

WHEREAS, Hideout Golf, LLC is responsible for the cost of the timber cut, however, if there is any credit associated with the timber cut, Hideout Golf, LLC shall be allowed to retain the credit;

THE CITY OF SOMERSWORTH ORDAINS THAT pursuant to Section 7.7(A) of the City Charter:

The annual budget for the City of Somersworth for Fiscal Year 22-23 is amended as follows:

Appropriate \$262,833 (Two Hundred Sixty-Two Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-Three dollars) from an unanticipated State of New Hampshire Extraordinary Needs Grant Revenue to the School Department Budget as follows;

#### Background:

This Ordinance appropriates a portion of an unanticipated revenue from the State of New Hampshire Extraordinary Needs Grant to the School Department. The net amount to be received from the State is \$262,833. The intent is to use this appropriation, for some or all of the following Capital Improvements based on actual cost; Upgrades to the High School Entrance to improve security; Upgrades to the SAU Office Entrance to improve security and ADA compliance; District Wide Security Upgrades to locks and card readers.

This Ordinance requires a public hearing and requires a 2/3 majority vote of the City Council after the public hearing subject to Section 7.4.1 and. Section 7.7 (A) of the City Charter.
